INTERNATIONAL COVENANT ON CIVIL AND POLITICAL RIGHTS
NEW YORK, 16 DECEMBER 1966

GEORGIA: NOTIFICATION UNDER ARTICLE 4 (3) ¹

The Secretary-General of the United Nations, acting in his capacity as depositary, communicates the following:

The Permanent Mission of Georgia to the United Nations presents its compliments to the Secretary-General of the United Nations and pursuant to Article 4 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights has the honor to inform that the emergency legislation already notified by previous Note N19/18571, dated 15 July 2020 and the subsequent Note N19/34515, dated 31 December 2020 has been extended until 1 January 2022.

In particular, since the global and the local threat of COVID-19 still remains significant, on 22 June 2021, the Parliament of Georgia adopted and the President of Georgia approved the prolongation of the special emergency legislation until 1 January 2022.

For these reasons, it is submitted hereby that Georgia retains the already notified derogations from certain obligations under Articles 9, 12, 14, 17 and 21 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights until 1 January 2022. As underscored in our previous communications, these derogations apply to the obligations only to the extent strictly required by the exigencies of the persisting situation with the coronavirus.

The Permanent Mission of Georgia to the United Nations attaches to this Note the unofficial translations of the amendments to Law of Georgia on ‘Public Health’ and Criminal Procedure Code of Georgia dated 22 June 2021.²
